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SAFER INTERNET DAY 2025



Safer Internet Day 2025 is scheduled for February 11th, 2025, with activities and learning centered around the theme 'Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from scams online.'

Safer Internet Day stands as the UK's largest celebration of online safety. Each year, the UK Safer Internet Centre addresses a relevant online issue or theme that reflects the experiences of young people in the digital world. This year's focus will be on online scams, emphasising how young individuals can safeguard themselves and others, along with the support available to them.

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EMPOWERING YOUNG PEOPLE

Developed by educational professionals, the Childnet Digital Leaders Programme offers engaging, informative, and enjoyable online learning modules that address the latest trends and issues in online safety. Young individuals navigate these modules on our gamified platform, empowering them with the skills necessary to not only succeed online but also to educate and support their peers.

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FILTERING & MONITORING

Schools and colleges are legally obligated to ensure the safety of children and young people both online and offline. Governing bodies and owners must ensure that their institutions implement suitable filtering and monitoring systems, as outlined in the statutory guidance titled "Keeping Children Safe in Education." The UK Safer Internet Centre has produced a guide for educations meeting about establishing 'appropriate levels' of filtering and monitoring.

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REPORTING

There are times when we can come across something hurtful, damaging or upsetting when we are online. When we see something online that we know is harmful, it is time to take action and report it. The South West Grid for Learning (SWGfL) has a page dedicated to Online Reporting. It includes guidance on when should you make a report and who should you report to.

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
